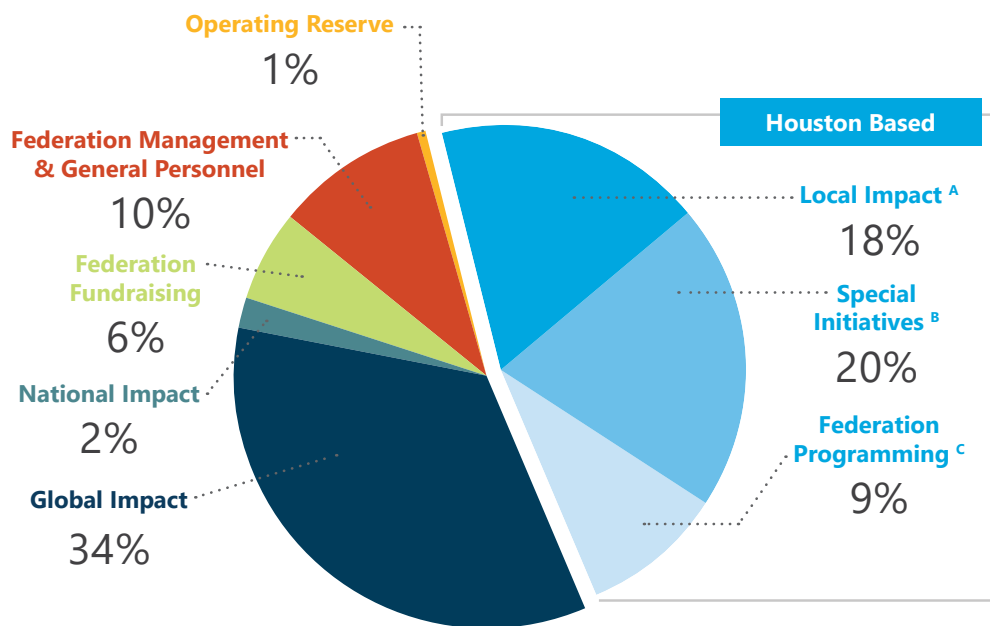

BUILDING DEDICATION

Named in honor of Velva and H. Fred^z Levine, who gave the lead gift for the building campaign, the new Federation building was dedicated on December 4, 2022. **The \$3.5 million building is part of the Evelyn Rubenstein Jewish Community Center's \$50 million full campus revitalization project.**

When Hurricane Harvey struck in August 2017, flooding the J campus and much of Houston, the future of the Jewish community was uncertain. The Jewish Federation is proud to partner with the J on the campus revitalization, which renews the area as the hub of Jewish life in our community and strengthens Houston's Jewish future.

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HINENI HOUSTON: COME AND BE HEARD

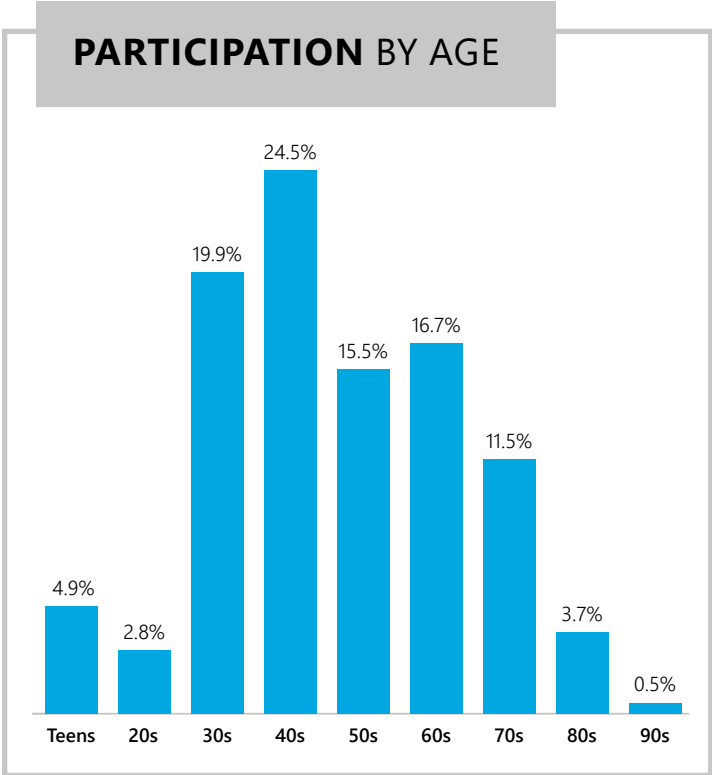
During the fall and winter of 2022-2023, the Federation embarked on “Hineni Houston: Come and Be Heard,” a community-wide listening journey that engaged more than 1,200 Houstonians as part of its strategic planning process. **Participants were asked the central and personal question, “What are your aspirations for Houston’s Jewish community, now and for the future?”** The conversations were facilitated by community volunteers and Federation staff members. The input collected is being analyzed and the key themes that emerge will help guide the future of the Federation and Houston’s Jewish community.

The Federation’s Trustees will use these results as an essential part of strategic planning and they will be shared with local Jewish organizations and the community in spring 2023.

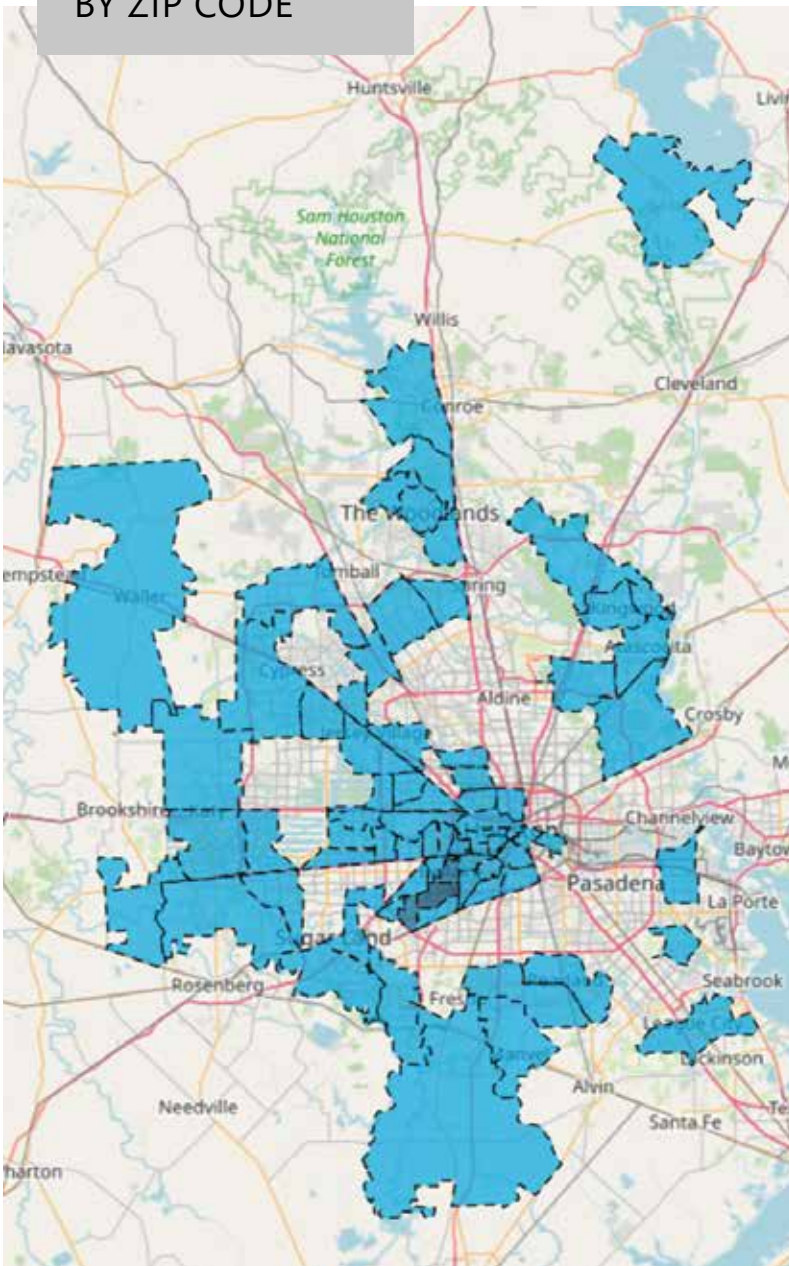

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Hineni Houston is a part of how the work of the Federation is evolving. **Beginning with the 2023 Campaign, the Federation will begin a Local Impact Fund to address the emerging needs of the community.** This will allow for new and innovative programming, along with funding for organizations that do not currently receive Federation support. The findings from Hineni Houston will help set the priorities of this new fund.

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SECURITY

The focus of this work is to provide threat assessments of local Jewish institutions, conduct safety and security trainings throughout the community, and liaison with law enforcement both during and outside of crisis situations.

Al Tribble, our Community Security Director, is employed by both the Federation and Secure Community Network (SCN), the official safety organization for the Jewish community in North America.

In 2022, through a partnership with SCN and more than 30 other Jewish Federations, the Federation launched a new, standardized online form for the public to report threats, incidents, and suspicious activity related to Jewish organizations, facilities, or community members. **The form is available on the Federation's website at houstonjewish.org/security and clicking the "Report an Incident" button.**

Thanks to the generosity of Joan and Stanford Alexander, the Federation was able to launch Houston's Jewish Community Security Program and hire Tribble as its first Community Security Director.



PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The Federation's public affairs work keeps our community connected to the legislative issues that impact the Houston Jewish community. It supports the collective by advocating for issues and funds that benefit our community, ensuring Jewish organizations have the resources necessary to apply for the Nonprofit Security Grant Program, and connecting our community to interfaith and government leaders. In fiscal year 2022, the Federation supported five Jewish institutions in securing nearly \$700,000 in federal Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP) funds. The Federation created a local network for the NSGP, which provides resources for those who have received an award and those looking to apply in 2023.



Through our work, we benefit the Houston Jewish community by ensuring they have a voice when decisions are made on the city, county, state, and federal level and that they have access to knowledge and resources to build a stronger and more resilient community.

ADDITIONAL SECURITY ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022

Trainings

Seven security training sessions for more than 300 people including staff from Jewish schools, organizations, teen groups, and the general community.

Threat Vulnerability Risk Assessment

Six site assessments are in process for Jewish schools, synagogues, and organizations to determine risks and security hardening needs.

Community Engagement

Tribble has visited with community members and conducted site visits to synagogues and schools to discuss threat landscape, security program priorities, and goals.

Law Enforcement Liaison/Training

Tribble participated in a US Justice Department panel discussion on hate crimes; attended the SCN National Homeland Security Summit; and collaborated and coordinated with multiple local law enforcement agencies during specific threat situations.



PJ LIBRARY

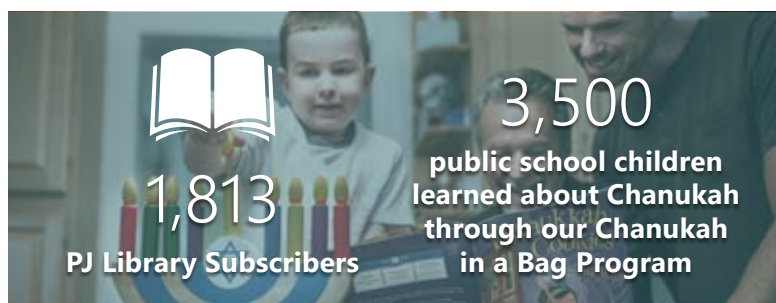
For children, exposure to Jewish content, values, and principles during their formative years is important to forging a lifelong connection to Judaism. **For many families in Houston, PJ Library is the first connection to the Jewish community.** By providing parents and caregivers with age-appropriate books and games, children ages 0-8 are exposed to Jewish holidays and Jewish concepts such as *tikkun olam* and *zedakah*. PJ Library programs provide opportunities for families to meet one another and engage with each other through dynamic programs across Houston.

HONEYMOON ISRAEL

Twenty Houston couples with diverse backgrounds and religious affiliations joined together in fall 2022 for Houston's first Honeymoon Israel trip led by Federation Engagement Associate Mari O'Leary and Congregation Emanu El Rabbi Josh Fixler. The group shared an interest in Judaism and searching for what role it could play in their young families.

Honeymoon Israel aims to create a fulfilling, welcoming experience for couples, ages 25-40, with at least one Jewish partner who do not yet have strong connections to Jewish life. Couples on the Houston trip included a mix of cultural, racial, gender, and sexual identities, and most were interfaith. The group formed lasting bonds and is continuing to learn, grow, and explore Jewish life together.



Ilana Freedman and Dave Ramish have been together for several years and plan to get married in 2023. Freedman was raised Jewish, attended The Emery/Weiner School, Camp Young Judaea-Texas, and has always felt culturally connected to her Judaism. Ramish grew up in a Catholic home, but hasn't felt very religious since his teenage years.

"Before the trip, I was familiar with the prayers and Shabbat, and I saw how important Judaism was to Ilana. But in most of my experiences with Judaism, I was the outsider – trying to pick up the words during Shabbat blessings, watching family greet friends at the synagogue or having to repeatedly ask basic questions about Judaism. By being a part of this group of couples who are all grappling with the same questions, and with the rabbi's help learning about Israel and Jewish culture and traditions, I've gained such a deeper understanding and appreciation of why Judaism is important to Ilana, and it's become more important to me, too.

ISRAEL YOUR WAY COMMUNITY MISSION

The Israel Your Way Community Mission, chaired by Leslie and Russ Robinson, was the journey of a lifetime for many in our community. Participants joined together to experience Israel as a group as well as enjoying special interest focus areas.

The trip included visits to Federation partners, sessions about Israeli innovation, and a deep dive in the complex issues of the Palestinian/Israeli conflict and religious pluralism. Every participant on the trip also visited Houston's partner city of Petach Tikvah outside of Tel Aviv.

TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Federation supports the professional development of our Jewish teachers through professional trainings, networks, resources for continuing education, and mentorship programs.

NETWORKS

The Federation's position in the Jewish community allows us to act as a central point of resources, best practices, and expertise. Weaving together the breadth and depth of diversity within our professional networks empowers organizations to become collaborators instead of competitors. This

partnership strengthens the tapestry of our thriving Jewish community. We serve as a catalyst to amplify our partners' work and identify and respond to emerging needs.

Our networks are inclusive of various groups of local Day School leadership, Early Childhood Directors, Congregational School leaders, teen engagement professionals, and more.

TEACHER-MENTOR PROGRAM

The Federation facilitates a Teacher-Mentor Program where 16 mentors work with teachers in Day, Early Childhood, and Congregational Religious Schools providing direct support to foster teacher growth and improvement to raise the quality of education at each school.

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SPOTLIGHT: EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

Early childhood education represents a unique opportunity to engage young children and their parents in a rich and meaningful Jewish communal life. It sets the foundation for future learning and future leadership.

The Federation addresses emerging needs in early childhood education by reducing barriers to participation and attracting and retaining quality teachers. While a single community cannot solve the national under-financing of early childhood education, a multi-faceted approach can address the challenges families and schools face to enable more families to begin their journey.



NEW THIS YEAR | THE MARVIN BARISH RIGHT START PROGRAM

This program provides incentive grants for families enrolling their first child in a Jewish early childhood program for the first time. The program is patterned after Chicago's Jewish United Fund Right Start, and as a partner, JUF provides up to \$40,000 in matching grants to support Houston families. The Federation has set a goal to attract approximately 300 new students/families over the next five years.

THE EARLY CHILDHOOD TEACHER DEGREE PROGRAM

The Early Childhood Teacher Degree program provides forgivable loans to early childhood educators seeking advanced degrees to bolster the quality of programs. This elevates education in the Jewish early childhood programs and helps retain the best teachers.

Marvin Barish Right Start and the Early Childhood Teacher Degree program is a gift to families from the Jewish Federation of Greater Houston, thanks to the generosity of the Marvin Barish Endowment for Jewish Early Childhood Education Fund and other local donors.

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ISRAEL & OVERSEAS

HUMANITARIAN & COMMUNITY SUPPORT

The Federation is the leader in mobilizing our community's response to the local and global needs of the Jewish people. **We raise money each year to support Jewish people and organizations around the world that help those in need, build community, and strengthen our collective Jewish future.**

Through the Fund for Israel and Overseas, we keep our community connected to Israel and Jewish people worldwide. Support is allocated to programs in four priority areas: senior support, poverty relief, pluralism, and education.

SPOTLIGHT: HAND IN HAND – CENTER FOR JEWISH-ARAB EDUCATION IN ISRAEL

Hand in Hand (HIH) transforms the current Jewish-Arab reality in Israel by creating a growing network of integrated, bilingual, and multicultural schools in which Jewish and Arab students study together, learn each other's language, hear multiple viewpoints, and interact in an environment of equality and mutual respect.

Through its Pluralistic Education Initiative, HIH works to incorporate these principles into the Israeli public school system. This includes a multicultural preschool training program, providing teachers in Tel Aviv-Jaffa and Nof Hagalil with knowledge, materials, and tools to teach their multilingual, multicultural students. The program also develops and disseminates pluralistic curricula that includes teaching of shared holidays and Arabic as a second language.

RELIEF FOR UKRAINE

The Jewish Federations of North America has raised more than \$73 million to provide direct and immediate aid supporting humanitarian assistance for Ukrainian refugees and workers on the ground. The Jewish Federation of Greater Houston has contributed more than \$1 million to this effort.

Since the war began, close to seven million people have been displaced from their homes but remain in Ukraine. The Federation and its core partners—the Jewish Agency for Israel, American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), and World ORT—as well as dozens of other organizations, have provided critical relief to refugees of all backgrounds. Funding has supported urgent and evolving needs, including:

- Distributing nearly 2.7 million pounds of medical equipment, clothing, food, and hygiene products
- Feeding 239,851 people
- Evacuating 80,817 people away from danger zones
- Fielding 399,902 calls for assistance via special hotlines
- Supporting the arrival of 32,325 new immigrants in Israel from Russia, Ukraine, and Belarus

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EXPANDING OUR PARTNERSHIP

Partnership2gether: Petach Tikvah and JAFI

The Federation has maintained a partnership with the Yoseftal and Dado neighborhoods in the city of Petach Tikvah for more than 40 years. **In 2022, the Federation expanded its support for the city with Partnership2gether, a program in partnership with the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI).** In the program's first year, working committees have been appointed in Houston and Israel to build the partnership, develop the mission, vision, and goals, and select programs to support and create engagement opportunities. This expanded partnership is one of the Federation's new, multi-year fundraising initiatives.



BUILDING STRONGER CONNECTIONS WITH ISRAEL

The new partnership, Partnership2Gether (P2G) with Petach Tikvah, is an opportunity to create more intention between our two communities. 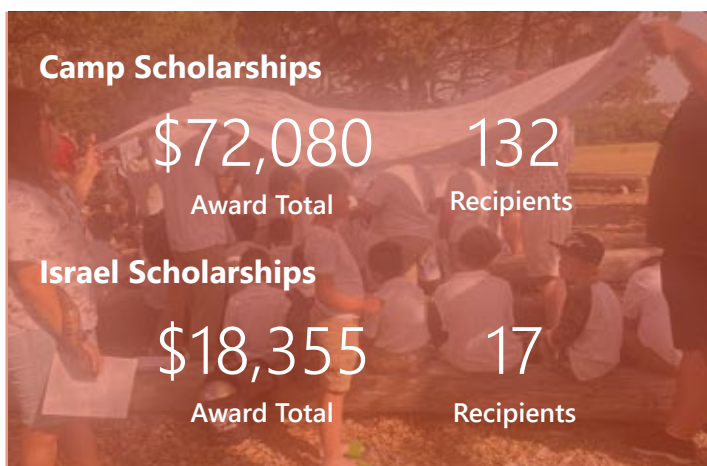
